Color Guard



AEROSPACE EDUCATION





C/TSgt. Sarah Martens (above) achieved one of her short-term goals, her powered flight solo! She said, "Two of my main long

term goals are to graduate from USAFA, and then become a military pilot. These goals led to my joining CAP, where I learned that kids my age can actually take flight lessons and become private pilots... It took me about 20 hours in a Grumman American AA1B to reach my solo flight, which I flew at Hartford airport on December 5th!

"The CAP aerospace tests we take for promotions helped me a lot along the way to my solo, with basic aerospace knowledge and science. Also helping me move towards my solo was Maj. Pretsch's summer CAP aviation discussion group, which deepened my interest and knowledge in aviation.

"A big thanks to CAP and all of its volunteers for helping me reach this milestone, and get one step closer to my goals!"

Meanwhile, C/Capt. Collin Nuss achieved his powered flight solo in a Cessna 172 on October 8th.

They learned how to do ramp checks and complete an ELT search during a training mission. They also enjoyed great camaraderie while experiencing life on a working farm!

Final Salute



One of Squadron #5's first cadets, Janice Papke, passed away on June 11th, at age 80. The former Jan Goderski joined CAP in the early 1950s, shortly after our unit was organized. As a cadet, she participated in many activities, including at least two search and rescue missions, a couple of encampments, and military balls. She received the Certificate of Proficiency, the equivalent of the Gen. Billy Mitchell Award and the highest cadet achievement award at that time. She served as Cadet Commander and promoted to Cadet Major.

Her early experience as a cadet instructor in our unit inspired her career choice. She became a teacher and taught in the Oak Creek-Franklin School District for over 30 years, retiring in 1995. Lt. Col. Jan Papke often taught at the Wisconsin Wing Cadet Conferences.

Jan and husband, Melvin Papke, who passed in 1999, served together in our unit. Theirs was probably the first successful Squadron 5 romance. They married in 1962 and were a great team: he as Unit Commander, she as Commandant of Cadets (Deputy Commander of Cadets). After Mel's turn at

Squadron Commander (1960-64), they both served at the Group level, Mel as Group Commander and Jan as Administration Officer. They both retired from CAP in the late 1970s.
